President's Report

The new COSA Strategic Plan was launched to the members via electronic correspondence and is now available on the COSA website. During their deliberations of this financial year's budget, the Board considered plans from many COSA Groups for activities aligned with COSA's new strategy. You can read the detail in the Group reports and I've listed some below:

- With the commitment of the AYA Group Chair Wayne Nicholls and the highly motivated Executive Committee, the AYA Group will continue its work on developing a plan for AYA research and a strategy for AYA services more broadly.
- Following successful mentoring programs in previous years, the Board has once again approved an Asia-Pacific Mentoring Fellowship.
- Building on the success of the Geriatric Oncology Group and their work on last year's ASM, Christopher Steer and his Group will hold a strategic planning day to develop a plan for future activities and a strategy to continue to engage the membership's interest in this field. Work already underway includes a project to inform geriatric assessment in oncological practice.
- Under the leadership of Sabe Sabesan, the Regional and Rural Group will host a meeting of the Regional Cancer Centre Directors.
 Feedback received from the Directors has been very positive, with many excited about the opportunity to come together in a COSA facilitated forum.

One of the four pillars in the COSA Strategic Plan is Advocacy – for COSA to advocate for matters affecting cancer service delivery, policy and care. In the coming year we will work closely with Cancer Council Australia (CCA) on the development of a joint "National Cancer Care Policy". CCA and COSA have a long and successful history of joint public policy development and promotion. Highlights have included work on:

- The Optimising Cancer Care report
- The regional cancer centres initiative
- Senate inquiries into cancer service delivery
- Many joint submissions to government consultations over more than a decade, focused on issues such as the health reform agenda, reviews of health and medical research policy
- Conferences focused on issues such as rural/regional services, adolescent and young adult cancer services etc

A joint CCA/COSA National Cancer Care Policy will build on the development of a comprehensive, evidence-based public policy agenda on supportive and clinical cancer care.

In other matters, Marie Malica and I recently met with Helen Zorbas at Cancer Australia for initial discussions around the development of cancer care standards. It is pleasing to see high level groups like Cancer Australia and Cancer Council Australia continue to engage COSA on such important national cancer control issues.

I am delighted to announce that the Board recently appointed Mr Peter Dowding and Ms Felicity Shaw as co-opted Board members with corporate governance and legal expertise. We were impressed by the strong field of candidates in response to our advertisement with the Australian Institute of Company Directors who are eager to work with COSA to help us meet our objectives and work within our new governance requirements as a company limited by guarantee.

Executive Officer's Report

COSA Annual Scientific Meeting 2014

I hope to see you all at the ASM in Melbourne this December. We moved our schedule slightly from the traditional second week of November to the first week of December for the exciting opportunity to collaborate with the UICC World Cancer Congress. The COSA ASM will run from Tuesday 2 to Thursday 4 December, and the WCC from Thursday 4 to Saturday 6 December. This means that Thursday will be a joint day between COSA and the WCC. Delegates can either register for the COSA ASM, the WCC, or both. Discounts are on offer if people register for both, and on the joint day delegates will be free to move between all sessions.

The detailed ASM program is now available online. Even though our disease focus is on lung cancer and metastatic disease, I am sure there will be many sessions of interest to COSA members treating other diseases. The themes of survivorship, palliative and supportive care are important for all cancer health professionals and cancer patients, so I am certain the program will appeal.

The opening plenary highlights the challenges of managing oligometastatic disease – something new for the COSA ASM. Bruce Mann will chair and provide an introduction to oligomets; Rod Hicks will present on the limitations of imaging in characterising this entity; Ben Solomon will talk about tailoring systemic treatments; Normand Laperriere will discuss the role of radiotherapy for oligomets; and Nathan Cherney's presentation will focus on how much treatments help in metastatic lung cancer using the ESMO Clinical Benefit Scale.

Bogda Koczwara will chair the Tuesday afternoon plenary delving into what works in the care of cancer survivors. Mary McCabe will provide an introduction to cancer survivorship and the standards of survivorship care; David Weller will talk about the new roles for GPs in cancer survivorship; Kerry Courneya will present on physical activity for symptom control through to survivorship; and Irene Higginson will discuss outcome measures in survivorship.

On Wednesday the program will focus on lung cancer. In addition to the very informative concurrent sessions throughout the day, we will open with a plenary on recent improvements in lung cancer care. Matthew Peters will open with the current state of lung cancer globally; Thomas Lynch will present on targeted therapies for NSCLC; Harvey Pass will discuss new surgical techniques; David Ball shares his wisdom



on radiotherapy for lung cancer; and Thomas Jagoe will enlighten us with new perspectives on symptom management during treatment for advanced lung cancer.

Thursday 4 December is our joint day with the World Cancer Congress and will open with a joint plenary on sustainable systems; and we will close with the hot topic of "New cancer drugs: Do the benefits justify the costs?"

In the Presidential Lecture, Jim Bishop will provide the Australian perspective on comprehensive cancer centres – who better given his current role as Executive Director of the Victorian Comprehensive Cancer Centre.

COSA Annual Scientific Meeting 2015

I am delighted to announce that the 2015 ASM will be held in Hobart at the Grand Chancellor Hotel, 17-19 November 2015, so mark the dates in your diary now!

Louise Nott and Allison Black, medical oncologists at Royal Hobart Hospital, have

kindly agreed to co-convene the meeting. They have floated some great program ideas already and we are considering a rare cancers theme. We are in the process of convening the local organising committee so please drop me a line if you have any ideas or would like to get involved.

Hobart has a lot to offer in terms of a destination, not just for a conference. So why not plan a family holiday in Tasmania after the ASM. I can highly recommend Tasmania if you haven't visited in recent years. There is something for everyone – food, wine, art, heritage, national parks, walks and hikes for all levels of fitness.

Other COSA educational opportunities

One of COSA's core goals is to meet the educational needs of the membership. Obviously the ASM is our key educational event but we are also exploring other ways and are keen to hear from you. We will be undertaking a survey of the membership soon, but I'd like to hear from you in advance if you have any burning ideas.

Recently COSA hosted the ACT and NSW Oncology Workshop (ACTNOW) in Bowral, 2-4 May 2014. This biennial event is hosted by COSA with financial support from Roche through an educational grant. This unique meeting focuses on a broad range of topics within medical oncology as well as key aspects of patient care across the spectrum of cancer care and general medicine. In attendance was a mix of 44 medical oncologists and advanced trainees.

Delegates learned about new advances in HER 2 positive breast cancer and the new molecular biomarkers in colorectal cancers. The increasing incidence of obesogenic cancers was highlighted as well as an organised approach to dermatological conditions in cancer patients. Updates on how to approach difficult conversations around survival prognostication, discussing high cost drugs and financial toxicity and engaging patient and partners concerns on sexual health were well covered.

The role of complementary and alternative medicines and the role of meditation and mindfulness in aiding patient recovery after treatment were highlighted. A Journal Club and critical appraisal of practice changing publications generated discussions around adoption of these measures within units.

As you can see ACTNOW provides an opportunity for delegates to learn about topics not presented at traditional oncology conferences in a relaxed and engaging environment. We hope to offer similar opportunities to COSA members in other states in the future.

Tom Reeve Award for Outstanding Contributions to Cancer Care

COSA is proud to announce the 2014 recipient of the Tom Reeve Award for Outstanding Contributions to Cancer Care, Professor John Zalcberg OAM.

Professor John Zalcberg was the Director, Division of Cancer Medicine, at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre in Melbourne, Australia for 17 years prior to recently taking up the position of Professor of Cancer Research in the School of Public Health and Preventative Medicine at Monash University.

After earning a Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery from the University of Melbourne and a PhD in cancer immunology, he served as Director of Medical Oncology at the Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital and as Director of Cancer Services at the Austin and Repatriation Medical Centre.

A founder of the Lorne Cancer Conference and the Australasian Gastrointestinal Trials Group (AGITG), he is immediate past Chair of the Board of AGITG after serving in this role for over 15 years and a past Board Member of Cancer Trials Australia. He is the current Co-Chair of the Cancer Drugs Alliance and Interim Chair of the Australian Clinical Trials Alliance.

A past Board Member of the NSW Cancer Institute, past President of the Clinical Oncological Society of Australia, and a past Member of the Consultative Council of the Victorian Cancer Agency, he has received a Medal of the Order of Australia Award (OAM) and the 2011 Cancer Achievement Award from the Medical Oncology Group of Australia.

Professor Zalcberg's clinical research interests include gastrointestinal cancer and health care outcomes. He has published more than 230 articles in peer-reviewed journals. He was a Principal Investigator for the EORTC advanced GIST trial in Australia and continues an active involvement in trials in this disease as well as other GI cancers. He continues an active clinical practice in GI cancer. As one of his referees stated in their nomination "I can think of no other Medical Oncologist or indeed anyone in the Cancer field in Australia who



is more deserving or who has contributed as much as Professor Zalcberg has over the last 30 years." They went on to sum up their nomination stating "Professor Zalcberg has managed to achieve all this and yet remains humble and unassuming and always acknowledges the input and contributions of others. He is a true leader and a wonderful man who I have the utmost respect for."

COSA encourages those attending its Annual Scientific Meeting to register for the conference dinner where Professor Zalcberg will deliver his oration and be presented with the Tom Reeve Award.

As we all ponder where that time went and how quickly the months fly by, I am pleased to be able to provide encouraging updates on behalf of the Clinical Trials and Research Professionals Group (CTRPG). Following on from the positive feedback our Group received following the Professional Development day held at last year's COSA ASM, we re-grouped and thought more about how best to serve our members and provide further opportunities in the area of professional development in the next 12 months.

Our Executive Committee has discussed the possibility of trying a more interactive way of providing professional development opportunities, perhaps web-based systems; this could be in the form of a webinar for training days or an online chat option for members to interact with us through the COSA site. The CTRPG will keep all of our members updated on these ideas and developments over the coming months. We are encouraged to have the support of COSA with the acceptance of our 2014/2015 Group Activity plan.

The longer term plan and activities for the CTRPG is to bring together as many clinical trials professionals as possible as we work towards common goals in each of our clinical trial centres. The Group would like to facilitate training opportunities and increase our recognition as a professional body within the industry. The Terms of Reference for the CTRPG Executive Committee have been updated this year and will be tabled at the August COSA Board meeting. Changes include the update to our Group's name. To keep our members informed the Terms of Reference also outlines the CTRPG's aims, which are to:

- promote and maintain the quality standards of clinical trial coordination in oncology research in Australia and New Zealand;
- respond to the dynamic needs of members by providing continuing education;
- provide a forum for discussion



and exchange of experiences and information;

- strengthen relationships across professional disciplines and with cooperative oncology groups; and
- foster research within the scope of clinical trials management.

Finally, a couple of positions have become vacant on the Executive Committee this year and we encourage nominations to join. A newsletter was recently circulated calling for nominations, if this sounds like you or you would like to learn more about the role of the Executive Committee please get in touch with any of the people named at the beginning of this report. Membership of the CTRPG is open to individuals involved in clinical cancer research including but not limited to clinical trial coordinators, research nurses, clinical research managers, data managers, clinical research associates, and health information managers involved in research.

Familial Cancer Group

The 2014 COSA/Human Genetics Society of Australia (HGSA) Familial Cancer Clinics Clinical Professional Day will be held Tuesday 12 August 2014, at the Mantra Resort, Kingscliff, NSW. This annual meeting is very clinically orientated and will give delegates clear ideas and understanding of how they might apply upto-date information about familial cancer in a clinic setting. The meeting is relevant to all professionals working in oncology.

The programme for 2014 is:

- 1. Genomics what can we translate to the clinic?
- 2. BRCA-associated prostate cancer the clinical issues
- Rare Cancers (Fanconi anaemia, familial leukaemia and a update on new rare cancer genes)
- 4. Germline CDH1 mutations: managing gastric and breast cancer risk

If you come to the Familial Cancer Clinics Clinical Professional Day, you may want to stay on for the annual "Familial Aspects of Cancer: Research and Practice" meeting, the annual combined clinical and scientific meeting of kConFab, the Australasian Colorectal Cancer Family Study, the Australian Breast Cancer Family Study, the Australian Pancreatic Genome Initiative and the International Sarcoma Kindred Study (August 13-15, also in Kingscliff). This meeting has attracted a number of high quality international speakers, and most are well recognised as leaders in their fields. For those of you interested in familial ovarian cancer, there is emerging evidence that the inhibin/activin pathway has a role in young onset serous adenocarcinoma of the ovary. Rare germline mutations have been identified in the INHA and INHBA genes. Further research is needed before the full clinical significance and frequency of mutations in this pathway is understood (see Tournier et al Germline Mutations of Inhibins in Early-Onset Ovarian Epithelial Tumors, Human Mutation 2014;35(3):294-7).

The protein BRG1 is encoded by the SMARCA4 gene and is part of the SWI/SNF complex – a complex that has an important role in the control of gene expression via chromatin remodelling. Somatic (tumour) mutations have previously been associated with a range of different cancers including medulloblastoma, lung and pancreatic cancer. Germline (heritable) mutations

have previously been described in the rare rhabdoid tumor predisposition syndrome type 2. A series of papers in the May 2014 issue of Nature Genetics (Jelinic et al p424-426, Ramos et al p427-429 and Witkowski et al p438-443) highlight the importance of germline mutations in the SMARCA4 gene in small-cell carcinoma of the ovary, hypercalcaemic type (SCCOTH), an aggressive ovarian cancer subtype that affects young women (mean age 23 years) and is refractory to standard chemotherapy with agents like cisplatin or cyclophosphamide. The groups also showed SMARCA4 mutated SCCOTH tumour tissue shows immunohistochemical loss of BRG1, confirming that immunohistochemistry can be used to target genetic testing to women likely to have a mutation. All three research groups are hoping to develop targeted therapies based on this new genetic knowledge. If effective agents are identified this could have therapeutic implications for a wide range of cancer types. Watch this space!

By the time of publication the COSA Geriatric Oncology Group would have held a pre-congress workshop to the Cancer Nurses Society of Australia (CNSA) Winter Congress. I will provide an overview of the workshop in the next edition of the Marryalyan and shortly, you will be able to access a full report on the discussion and outcomes via the COSA website. A huge thank you to Jane Phillips for facilitating this workshop and her team for developing a comprehensive program to support nurse – led strategies to identify the needs of the older cancer patient.

Tim To and Jane Philips have been leading a group of COSA Geriatric Oncology Group members in developing research activities and protocol to inform the role of geriatric assessment in oncological practice. The group has met three times since the beginning of year and are close to finalising their survey and semi-structured interview questions and research protocol. This collaborative work will put forward important research to guide future practice including the needs, and delivery for geriatric assessment for general oncologists. I will be able to report further on this progress later in the year, however, this is a very exciting scoping exercise to assist a strategy for the future direction for the COSA Geriatric Oncology Group.

I have had the honour of being an invited speaker at the 50th ASCO meeting in Chicago and at the next SIOG Asia Pacific (APAC) meeting in Singapore. The ASCO session was entitled "Developing a geriatric oncology presence at your academic institution or community-based practice" during which I was able to inform attendees of the geriatric oncology initiatives in Australia and around the world. We are recognised as being a country with a small but established geriatric oncology presence and COSA is the key to the viability of this effort. I will continue to reinforce the important work of the COSA group at the SIOG APAC meeting in July and hope that some of our members will attend this meeting. I look forward to presenting the work of the COSA group at such meetings in the future.

Our goals are to work at highlighting the deficiencies in service delivery and to enhance the equity of access to current best practice care, cancer services and clinical trials.

In June 2013 a new Regional and Rural Executive Committee was formed following a call for nominations from COSA members. Members of the new Executive Committee are directly involved in the delivery of care, working in regional and rural areas or are responsible for regional services. The Committee plan to meet bi-monthly by teleconference and face to face once a year.

The Executive Committee have identified several key priorities going forward. The first priority is to establish a formal network for directors and clinical leads of the Regional Cancer Centres. Urologic Oncology Group

Many members of the COSA Urologic Oncology Group will still be coming to terms with remarkable data presented at ASCO in June. The CHAARTED E3804 results were presented by Chris Sweeney at the plenary session and showed that the addition of six cycles of docetaxel to androgen deprivation in men with hormone-naïve prostate cancer led to a very substantial improvement in survival: 13.6 months for the study overall (57.6 months median overall survival compared to 44.0 months; hazard ratio 0.61), and 17 months improvement in the subgroup with high volume metastatic disease (49.2 vs 32.2 months, HR 0.60). These remarkable results represent the most substantial improvement in survival for men with metastatic prostate cancer since the introduction of androgen deprivation therapy itself. We can expect changes in clinical practice as a result. Clinicians should note however that docetaxel is not currently reimbursed for this indication under the PBS; we hope that this will be changed in the near future. It is remarkable to consider that the original pivotal trials of docetaxel in castrate-resistant prostate cancer were published only 10 years ago. So much is changing so rapidly in our field.

Other key presentations at ASCO in the genitourinary stream continued the theme of cancer immunotherapy. Everyone is a believer now but as a card-carrying immunotherapist I remember it was not so long ago that we were seen as the poor deluded unfortunates of the cancer research community! Presentations at ASCO demonstrated activity of the horribly-named "immune checkpoint" drugs in a range of diseases, including renal cell carcinoma and urothelial cancer. This area will continue to develop rapidly over the next few years and we look forward to new trials and new therapeutic options for these patients.

The Group itself otherwise has been fairly quiet. I encourage all members to consider using the COSA Urologic Oncology Group Forum, available via secure login on the COSA web site **www.cosa.org.au**. Go to Groups, Urologic Oncology, Discussion, and you will see options for posting discussions.

My thanks as always go to the other members of the Urologic Oncology Group Executive (Shomik Sengupta and Scott Williams), COSA Executive Officer Marie Malica, COSA Board and COSA Council, for their great support.

Colorectal cancer course

Participants from around Australia were sponsored by AGITG to attend the second annual Preceptorship in Colorectal Cancer, in Sydney on 25-26 July, 2013.

The two-day intensive learning course featured a comprehensive review of literature to allow participants to better understand the evolution of treatment for CRC in the adjuvant and metastatic settings, in the context of current treatment.

The course especially targeted trainees and junior consultants in Medical, Radiation and Surgical Oncology. CRC topics covered included basic biology and translational science, current therapies, adjuvant therapy, treatment paradigms, and treatment pathways involving liver resection to achieve cure.



Making a mark at ASCO

AGITG also continues to make hefty contributions to the worldwide GI cancer research effort. Eight AGITG clinical trial papers have featured at the American Society of Clinical Oncology (ASCO) Annual Meeting in Chicago from 30 May to 3 June 2014.

The meeting brought together more than 25,000 oncology professionals from a broad range of specialties to explore the theme of "Science and Society."

ASCO promotes and provides for lifelong learning for oncology professionals; cancer research; an improved environment for oncology practice; access to quality cancer care; a global network of oncology expertise; and educated and informed patients with cancer.

Australasian Leukaemia and Lymphoma Group



The ALLG is unique in having two Scientific Meetings each year, held in May and November, and rotating through Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Brisbane. Recognising the central importance of the sites in the conduct of trials, they always include two full days of activities for data managers/research nurses.

The first day is a special haematology educational day. At the May meeting, the focus was Acute Myeloid Leukaemia, with presentations given by leading haematologists Andrew Wei (Alfred Hospital), David Westerman (Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre), Melita Kenealy (Cabrini Hospital) and David Ritchie (Royal Melbourne Hospital). These intensive full day courses provide site staff with unparalleled training in the knowledge necessary to run our highly technical haematology trials. Support from Roche Australia allows us to provide this educational day at no cost to participants.

The second day is devoted to selected ALLG trials and short educational presentations. A highlight at the May Data Managers/Research Nurses Day was the first presentation of a newly established award, the Janey Stone Perpetual Award.

The creation of this Award was part of the 40th anniversary commemoration of the group in 2013 and it honours Janey's advocacy for the professional role of trial coordinators and site staff.

The Award was established in recognition of the fact that trial coordinators, data managers and research nurses play a pivotal role in the conduct of ALLG trials and yet have only very limited access to funding to support projects and professional development. It is named for Janey Stone who was a Trial Centre Trial Coordinator and Executive Officer of the ALLG. For over 25 years she promoted recognition of the data managers/ research nurses within the ALLG clinical research process, instigated training and travel opportunities and conducted research projects resulting in conference presentations and publications.

The aims of the award include

- Promotion of professional development and skills
- Encouragement of the study and improvement of trial processes
- Allow the ALLG to draw upon the wealth of knowledge, skills, experience and expertise found amongst trial coordinators, data managers and research nurses for the benefit of the ALLG trials program and ultimately patients with haematological malignancies.

The award, worth \$2000, is open to all Associate Members of the ALLG and is offered in two categories - a travel grant or to undertake a project.

The first recipient was Naomi Sprigg from the Royal Melbourne Hospital. As the Haematology Tissue Bank Coordinator, she carries out a very important role in assisting collection, processing, transport and storage of blood and bone marrow samples for ALLG trials and the ALLG Tissue Bank. The funding assisted her to attend and present a poster at the International Society for Biological and Environmental Repositories (ISBER) Conference in Orlando Florida in May.



In her application Naomi commented: "Attending ISBER will enable me to ensure I am up to date with national and international trends in human specimen repositories, including approaches to tissue banking, ethics and consent process."

ALLG trials have associated laboratory collaborative studies, and in addition the ALLG Tissue Bank is a nationally based repository of samples from both trial and non-trial patients. As such it is an incomparable resource for future translational research. Naomi will give a presentation at the November Data Managers/Research Nurses Day. She will also have an ongoing role in assisting the ALLG with sample coordination issues and the Tissue Bank, based on her site experience and skills and knowledge learnt at the conference.

Australia New Zealand Gynaecological Oncology Group

2013 was a stellar year for ANZGOG. Highlights included our highest recorded clinical trial recruitment numbers (864 patients recruited in 2013) and an all-time highest open trials portfolio, with 8 trials in operation. Furthermore, from a financial perspective as well, 2013 was our best year with a significant contribution from a bequest to ANZGOG research. Sowing from this success ANZGOG ploughed into 2014 with vigour and determination.

The first half of 2014 has been tremendously busy, productive and stimulating. We had a very successful combined Annual Scientific Meeting with the Australian Society of Gynaecological Oncologists (ASGO) at the Hyatt Hotel in Canberra. The theme of the conference was 'Progress through collaboration and innovation'. The 227 delegates from across Australia and New Zealand who attended the conference had plenty of opportunity for debate, discussion and reflection. This year we had three leading international keynote speakers: Professor Lynette Denny, Gynaecological Oncologist and President of IGCS from the Groote Schuur Hospital, South Africa; Professor Jonathan Ledermann, Medical Oncologist from UCL Cancer Institute, University College London, UK and Associate Professor Akila Viswanathan, Radiation Oncologist from Harvard Medical School, USA. They shared their expertise, knowledge and insight on current gynaecological cancer research, on obesity and its implications for cancer treatments and the inequities in care of women with gynaecological malignancies.

Along with the thought-provoking scientific sessions at the conference, ANZGOG members also coordinated and held 3 Tumour Type Working Group meetings with involvement from 25 members, a 2-part Brachytherapy workshop, a well-attended Study Coordinator Workshop on 'Audit Readiness: building in quality through harmonisation and process improvement' and a Clinical Research Ideas Starter Workshop. The conference was also the platform for 19 Abstract presentations by ANZGOG members and 6 new Trial Concept presentations. The ANZGOG Research Advisory Committee was especially interested in the trial concept presentations for deliberation on potential future ANZGOG trials.



Our fundraising and public awareness campaign has also made amazing strides this year. ANZGOG partnered with the Big Film Festival in Sydney and hosted the movie 'No Evidence of Disease' (N.E.D.). This award winning movie is about a group of musicians who are also gynaecological oncologists in the USA and documents their music, their lives and their patients. The charity night hosted over 150 guests supporting ANZGOG and our mission. It was an extremely thrilling night for us.



We have excellent success with philanthropic and government grants with support for our New Research Fund and from BUPA funding for the MOST Study. ANZGOG was also very fortunate to have been awarded a 3 year NHMRC Grant for the PARAGON Trial. This is a huge success for ANZGOG.

I look forward to continuing our collaborative work in improving the life of women with gynaecological cancer through research and reporting on many more successes this coming year.

Our Members

Membership of the Medical Oncology Group of Australia Incorporated (MOGA) continues to grow with the number of trainees entering speciality training through the Royal Australasian College of Physicians growing annually; consultant membership running at an all-time high; and, increasing numbers of members participating in Association initiatives. As a professional membership organisation, MOGA recognises the valuable contribution our members make to the development of medical oncology practice, research and education not only in Australia but globally. Indeed, Professor Geoff Lindeman who is the distinguished recipient of the 2014 Cancer Achievement Award, has a truly unique international profile in oncology, and exemplifies the very best in Australian Medical Oncology research and practice.

Oncology Drugs and Treatments

The MOGA Oncology Drugs Working Group, set up to pursue oncology drugs and treatment matters as well as meet quarterly with the Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee (PBAC) as a clinical advisory body continues to chalk-up notable successes. The meetings with the PBAC have proven to be an important forum for addressing national oncology issues and allowing MOGA to provide quality, up-to-date advice on clinical practice and trial developments directly to key decision-makers and ministerial advisers. The Working Group is facing an ever-expanding agenda with new items presenting for consideration at every meeting. This includes not only new oncology drugs and treatments but systemic and process issues, both old and new. For instance, the need to update the approved indications for prescription medicines, above all older oncology drugs, on the Australian Register of Therapeutic Goods. In particular, how product information for medicines could be changed over time to reflect an accumulation of evidence and changes in clinical practice.

Her2 Positive Metastatic Breast Cancer Drugs-PBAC Meeting

MOGA recently participated in a stakeholder meeting for Her2 positive metastatic breast cancer drugs convened by the PBAC. The meeting considered existing HER2 therapies (trastuzumab, lapatinib, and pertuzumab and trastuzumab emtansine) and future clinical management algorithms for metastatic breast cancer as well as non-Public Benefit Scheme (PBS) Herceptin programme eligibility criteria and PBS restrictions. The meeting agreed on how the new drugs for metastatic breast cancer could be used in keeping with best clinical practice and evolving clinical evidence; and that it was important to allow shared decision making on choice of treatment between clinicians and patients.

PBAC Meeting

There are an increasing number of oncology drugs and therapies on the agenda that are up for consideration at PBAC meetings. The PBAC recently sought the Association's advice regarding the clinical place in therapy of enzalutamide for patients with metastatic prostate cancer who have received chemotherapy and aberaterone



for patients with metastatic prostate cancer who have progressed following treatment with androgen deprivation therapy. Additional MOGA submissions have gone to the PBAC on obinutuzumab for the treatment of adult patients with untreated chronic lymphocytic leukaemia in combination with chlorambucil. Obinutuzumab was the first medicine approved with the FDA's Breakthrough Therapy Designation; Brentuximab vedotin for the treatment of adult patients with relapsed or refractory systemic anaplastic large cell lymphoma who are suitable for further systemic curative-intent salvage therapy. Trials results led to the accelerated approval of this drug by the US Food and Drug Administration in a patient population with few other alternative options.

Post-market Review of Authority Required PBS Listings

As part of the National Medicines Policy Framework, the Department of Health commenced a Post-market Review of Authority Required PBS Listings in late May. The objective of the Review is to improve patient safety and care by reducing red tape and administrative burden for health professionals. The need for the review was identified in the **Review of Chemotherapy Funding** Arrangements, where it was found that Authority Required listings caused significant regulatory burden to prescribing medical oncologists. There are currently 447 phone or complex authority required listings on the PBS. The Authority Required listings will be identified and reviewed in groups targeting those that create the greatest regulatory burden with the first priority area being Authority Required listings relating to the use of drugs in cancer. The Review will be undertaken with input from key stakeholders including the Australian Medical Association, the Royal Australian College of General Practitioner and MOGA. I have agreed to act as the MOGA representative on the Review's Reference Group.

Annual Scientific Meeting 2014 and 2015

Molecular and Immunologic Advances

into Practice is the theme of the 2014 MOGA Annual Scientific Meeting (Sydney Hilton, 6-8 August; Best of ASCO Australia 2014, 9 August) and provides an important focus for our national meeting. Professor Paul de Souza, Professor and Foundation Chair, Medical Oncology, School of Medicine University of Western Sydney and Director, Medical Oncology, Liverpool Hospital is the Meeting Convenor and along with the planning team has organised an innovative meeting program that explores many of the contemporary challenges and advances in medical oncology research, discovery and clinical practice. The 2015 ASM Pathways in Medical Oncology - The Path Less Travelled is now locked in to be held in Hobart from 5-7 August with Dr David Boadle from Royal Hobart Hospital acting as the Convenor.

Trainee Matters

Dr Mark Shackleton, Pfizer Australia Senior Research Fellow, Veski Innovation Fellow and Group Leader, Melanoma Research Laboratory at the Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre, has developed an innovative program for this year's Sciences of Oncology Program (8-9 November 2014, Melbourne) that will focus on translational sciences and research as well as current advances in cancer treatment and their relevance to the clinic, such as developmental biology, immunology, genetics, canceromics and pharmacology. This program ensures that Australian medical oncology trainees understand the sciences that underpin our speciality and, that their clinical and knowledge bases align with the rapidly changing discipline of oncology.

National Prescribing Service (NPS) - Choosing Wisely

MOGA is participating in the NPS Medicine Wise **Choosing Wisely** program which encourages clinicians, consumers and health care stakeholders to think about and discuss medical tests and procedures that may be overused, unnecessary or harmful. Over 50 specialist medical colleges and associations in the United States have signed up to this initiative, and develop and maintain their own lists of medical tests and procedures they believe should be considered carefully.

YOGA

At this year's ASM MOGA will be launching the Young Oncologists Group of Australia – YOGA. YOGA aims to provide young medical oncologists who are members of MOGA and have attained their fellowship within the last 5 years with a networking framework and assistance to facilitate their transition from advanced trainee to consultant. The Group will roll out a range of programs over the next few years but at this stage the focus is on putting in place a range of specially tailored educational and professional development initiatives.
