ANTOINETTE ANAZODO

Dr Anazodo trained in Paediatric and Adolescent Oncology in the United Kingdom and completed her training with a clinical fellowship in the Kids Cancer Centre at Sydney Children's Hospital. She has also completed a postgraduate diploma in Adolescent Oncology and developed a comprehensive understanding of the issues specific to AYA patients.

Antoinette was appointed Director of Adolescent and Young Adult (AYA) Cancer at Sydney Children's and Prince of Wales Hospital in October 2010 and has subsequently developed a comprehensive AYA cancer service across both the paediatric and adult cancer centres. This appointment has also provided opportunities for clinical and research collaboration especially in the area of oncofertility research.

Antoinette is a board member on CanTeen Strategic Advisory Group and Youth Cancer Research Group, and a member of the COSA AYA Executive Committee. She is co-chair for the updated COSA fertility preservation guidelines and a member of the international working group on fertility preservation and co-chair of the Oncofertility Think Tank.

BELINDA KIELY

Belinda Kiely is a medical oncologist at both Concord and Campbelltown hospitals. She specialises in the treatment of breast cancer. Belinda is also a clinical research fellow at the NHMRC Clinical Trials Centre, University of Sydney. Her main research interest is improving the way oncologists estimate and explain survival time to patients with advanced cancer and this was the subject of her PhD. Belinda led the development and evaluation of the iTool, a web-based tool to help oncologists estimate and communicate survival time for patients with advanced cancer.



NATASHA MICHAEL

A/Prof Natasha Michael is Director of Palliative Medicine at Cabrini Health, Head of Palliative Care at the University of Notre Dame, Sydney School of Medicine and Adjunct Clinical Associate Professor at the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences, Monash University. She has trained and worked internationally in palliative care in the United Kingdom, Ireland, Singapore and Australia including Kings College in London, the National Cancer Centre, Singapore and Peter MacCallum Cancer Centre. In 2013 Natasha successfully instigated the development of an integrated palliative care service across Cabrini Health, promoting a model of early integration and ambulatory palliative services for cancer patients, with specific expertise in multidisciplinary cancer pain management. She has led the development of the first palliative care research program at the Cabrini Institute focusing on psycho social and psycho oncology research, models of service provision, bioethics and whole person care.

DR KATRIN SJOQUIST

Dr Sjoquist is a Staff Specialist in Medical Oncology at St George & Sutherland Hospitals, and a visiting Medical Oncologist at St George Private Hospital. She also works at the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) Clinical Trials Centre at The University of Sydney as Clinical Lead, for AGITG, ANZGOG & GCCTI Trials, and Senior Lecturer.



DR KATRIN SJOQUIST continued

Following completion of medical oncology core training at St George and Prince of Wales Hospitals, she undertook a 2 year fellowship in clinical trials research and evidence based medicine, resulting in publications in major oncology journals including Lancet Oncology, and The Oncologist.

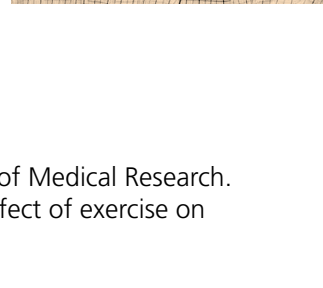
Dr Sjoquist's clinical practice is based around the treatment of gastrointestinal (upper and lower GI/colorectal) and head and neck cancers. Dr Sjoquist is currently an investigator and clinical lead on several national and international trials of treatments to improve outcomes for patients with Gastrointestinal and Gynaecological cancers. Her research interests include development of clinical trials and methods for evaluation of treatments, and she is also lead investigator on research projects designed to establish better models for clinical trials design and integration of research outcomes into practice.

In addition, Dr Sjoquist is committed to teaching and training junior doctors and researchers. She is a College examiner and faculty member of the Australia and Asia Pacific Clinical Oncology Research Development Workshop (ACORD).



MARTIN STOCKLER

Martin is Professor of Oncology and Clinical Epidemiology at the University of Sydney, Oncology Co-Director at the NHMRC Clinical Trials Centre, and medical oncologist at the Concord Cancer Centre CRGH and Chris O'Brien Lifehouse RPA. His clinical practice focuses on prostate, bladder, kidney, and testis cancers. His research focuses on using cancer clinical trials to improve survival, quality of life, prognostication, decision-making, and doctor-patient communication.
